Recycle	<u>e smart program</u>	Noted
-	Elspeth advised that this scheme commenced in December 2023. 3.7 tonnes has been collected from 1000 homes in the LGA to date. Soft plastics account for 1000kg or 60% of collection Clothing is 1500kg, ewaste 640 kg and general 600 kg. Cllr Pedersen asked if there was a limit? Yes, currently to 2 shopping bags of waste which can be collected from each home. Balu noted that in Lane Cove 'Homecycle' is another system which operates in other areas. Jane V asked: if it is limited to a number of ppl encouraged to participate as her neighbours don't know about it. Elspeth provided that extensive marketing has been done to encourage citizens through all available channels, reaching full saturation of service ability. Numbers continue to steadily increase and Council is not concerned with participation. The key benefit of Recycle Smart is in the soft plastic collection as the other items are readily available through various means for the majority of community. The other key benefit is for those who have limited mobility/ accessibility to be able to use the services for recycling normally.

	Resilient Sydney works with all Sydney Councils, including COR. The work between Resilient Sydney and COR started in 2016. A five year strategy has been undertaken with a government granted needed to complete the next strategy which will be in place for 2025-2030. The 2 nd Strategy has more of a People centric focus from feedback collected and reviewed – findings that people are overwhelmed, struggling to cope, lack of trust/ confidence, housing affordability. Risks- exposure to global supply chain

-	Lane Cove Council has a list of trees that people have a permit to cut down. This allows community members to check if tree removals have been approved. COR does not have a similar system. Sandra: It would take a lot of work to achieve this and very hard to maintain but notes COR has issued a number of penalty infringement notices for illegal tree works. It is hoped word will spread and this will discourage illegal removals. It was noted that a significant tree register is kept.	Noted
